Responsibility

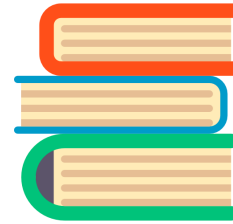
Being reliable and following through on commitments. This includes being responsible for your actions as a family member, teacher, student and citizen. You can demonstrate your responsibility through service to others and self control.

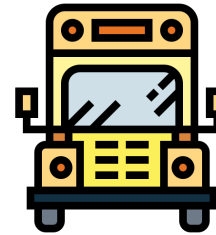

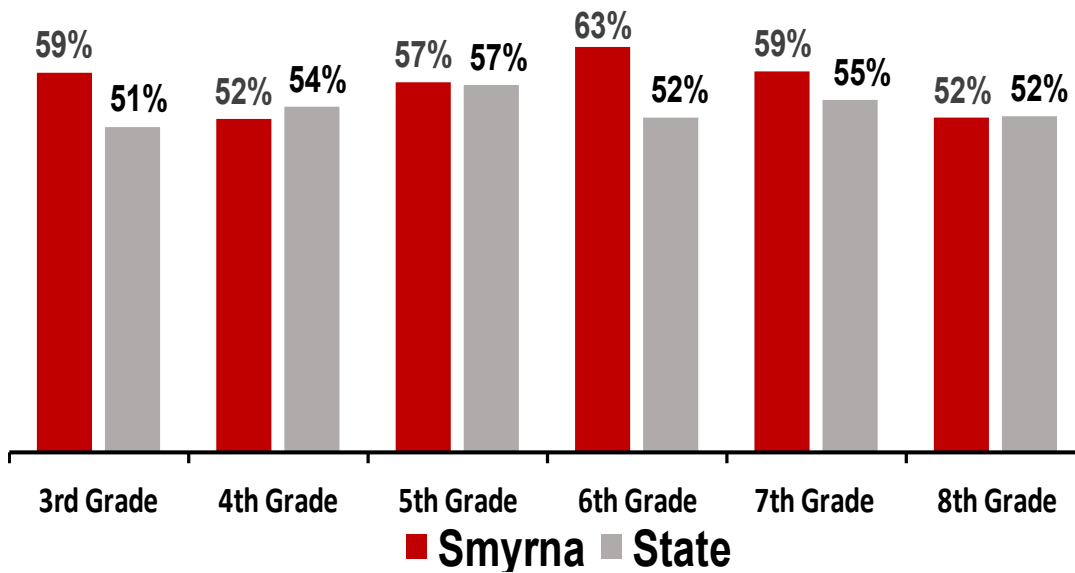

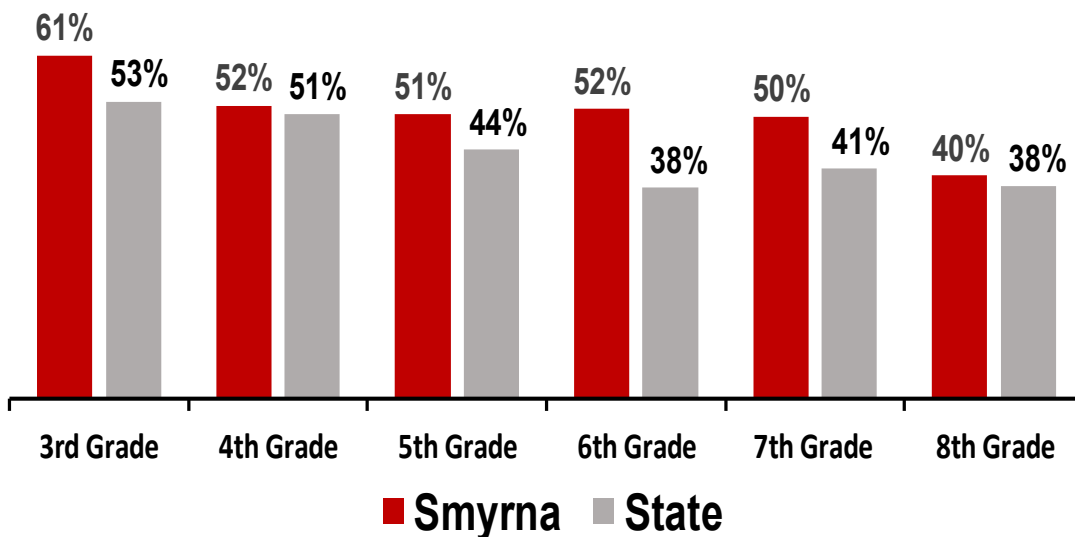
ELA Smarter Balanced Assessment

(% Proficiency Grade Level)



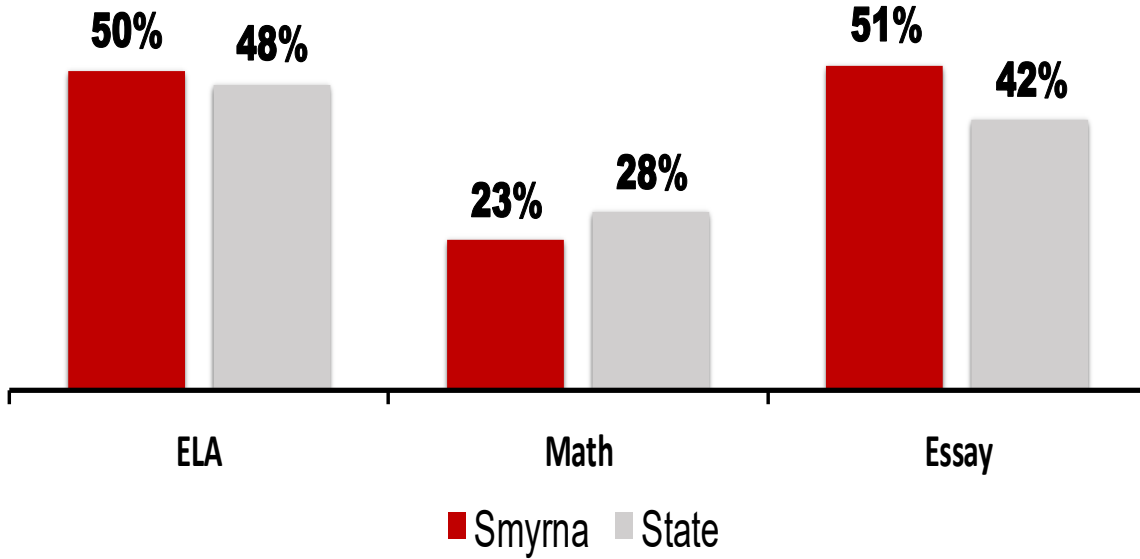
Math Smarter Balanced Assessment

(% Proficiency Grade Level)

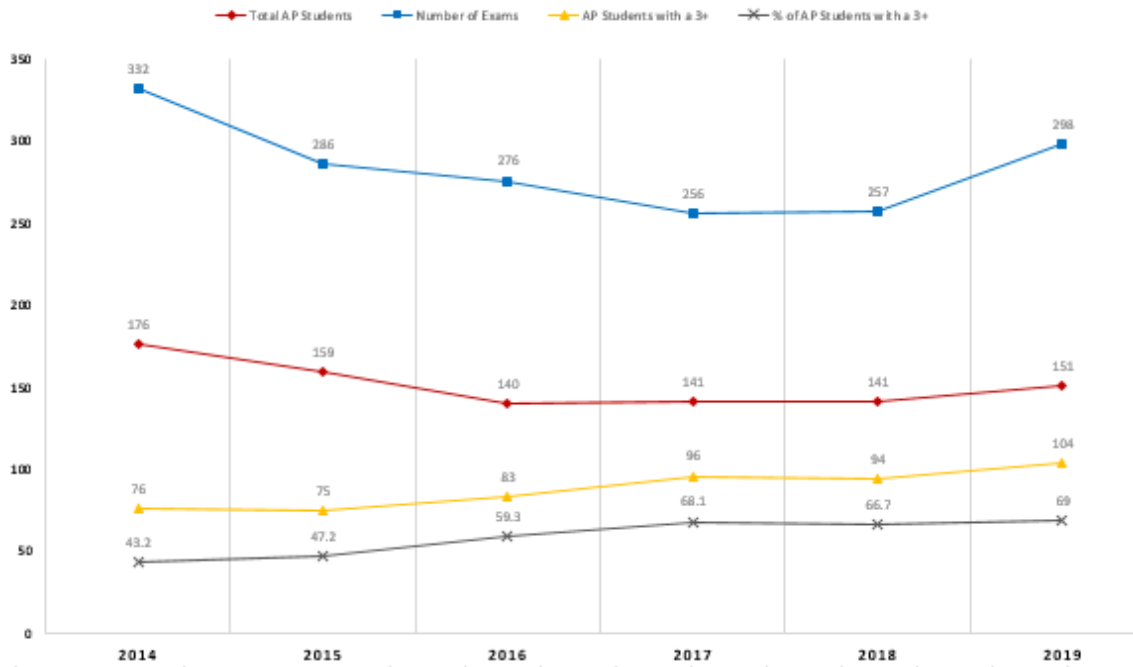


SAT / AP Summary

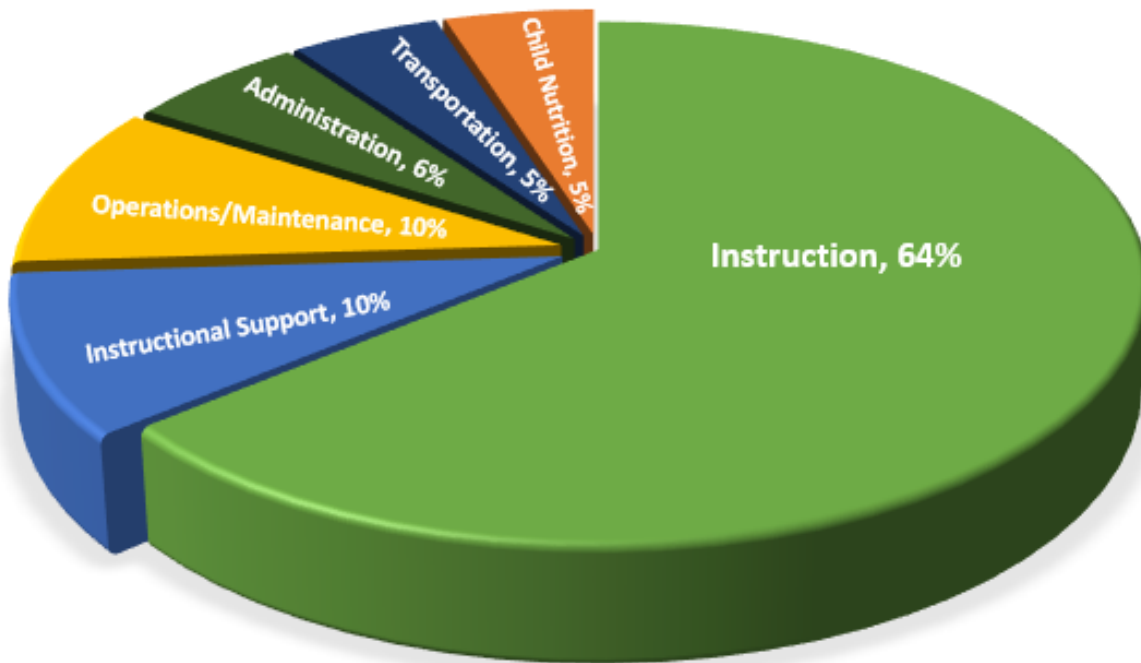

Financial Philosophy

The Smyrna School District recognizes that meticulous planning and organization of its financial affairs is critical to the efficient long-term operation of the district. The Smyrna School District maintains a fiscally conservative policy. District budgetary estimates and financial projections are based on a moderately conservative approach to funds projections with a balanced budget each fiscal year funded exclusively from current-year revenues. These policies afford the Smyrna School District the ability to remain consistent, stable, and financially secure in the short-term and well into our future.

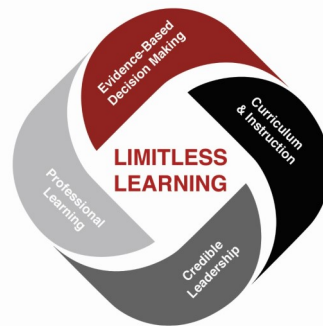

The Office of Curriculum and Instruction works with all educators and administrators within the Smyrna School District to improve the education of our students. The Office of Curriculum and Instruction are responsible for the adoption and implementation of all curriculum throughout the district. In addition to this, the team ensures that daily instruction reflects research-based best practice. In order to best serve Smyrna's students and teachers, the team must be fully-informed and up-to-date in current classroom practices. To accomplish this, the team schedules regular visits to our classrooms; this year, the Office of Curriculum and Instruction has visited more than 2,000 classrooms. These visits have led to meaningful professional development that is targeted to each building, grade-level, and teacher. The Office of Curriculum and Instruction conducted more than 60 unique opportunities for professional learning over the last year; totaling over 200 hours of training, in addition to site-based coaching visits to individual schools and classrooms. While professional development is very unique and targeted to the needs of the teacher, many of the sessions have addressed the implementation of newly-adopted high quality instructional materials in both English Language Arts and Mathematics.

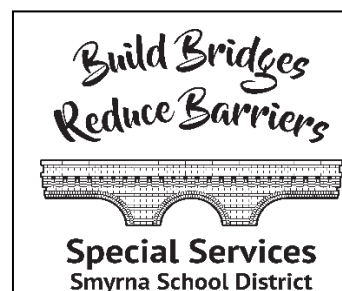

Vision

The Smyrna Special Services Team will provide students access to a dynamic education within the Smyrna School District that inspires and promotes each student's academic promise.



Mission

The Smyrna Special Services Team engages in collaboration and problem solving with staff, students, and families to develop meaningful, comprehensive plans to support students' success.

The Special Services Office facilitates services for students in accordance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act (IDEIA), Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act, and the McKinney Vento Homeless Assistance Act. We have over 50 staff members, including educational diagnosticians, school psychologists, speech-language pathologists, occupational/physical therapists, and instructional specialists (math, reading, behavior). We also have an early childhood coordinator, secondary coordinator, software support technologist, assistive technology specialist, behavior analyst, transition coordinator, community outreach and homeless coordinator, community support and truancy paraprofessional, teacher of the deaf/hard of hearing, and administrative assistants.

The Special Services Office seeks to support students by collaborating with families, teachers, administrators, and community agencies. We help school teams review data to develop meaningful plans that support student success, both academically and behaviorally. Our team also provides direct services to students to support their developmental and social/emotional needs (e.g., specialized reading and math instruction, individual and group counseling, social skills development, mentoring, speech-language and occupational/physical therapy). The Special Services Office monitors student progress and makes sure that students are receiving appropriate accommodations and modifications within the least restrictive environment that supports their needs. Classroom walkthroughs and audits are completed to ensure compliance with state and federal regulations. Our focus continues to be reducing barriers that prevent students from fully engaging in their educational experience.

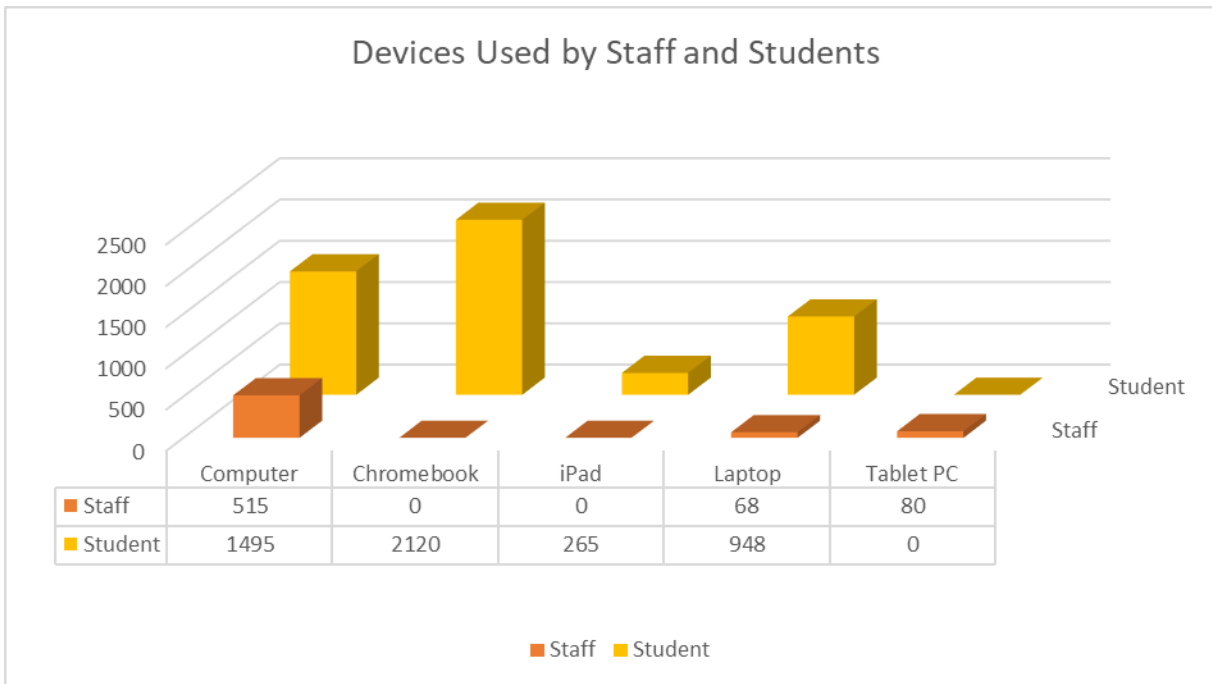

Total devices available to students in the Smyrna School District = 4,828

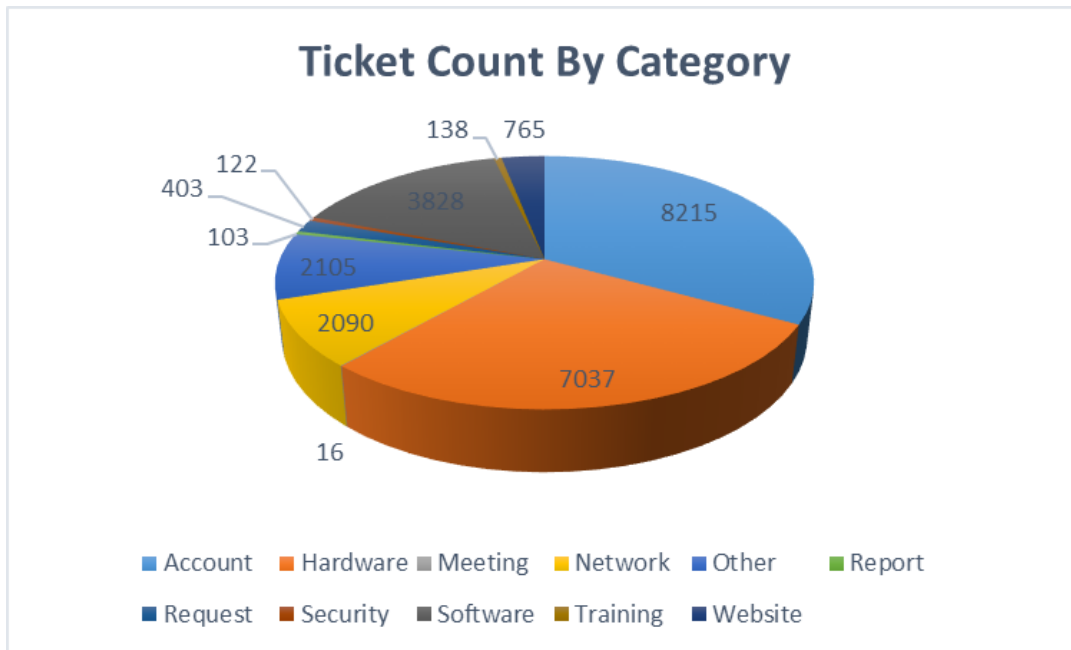


The Technology Mission includes:

- Providing stable, secure physical environment for monitoring and protection of students and staff.

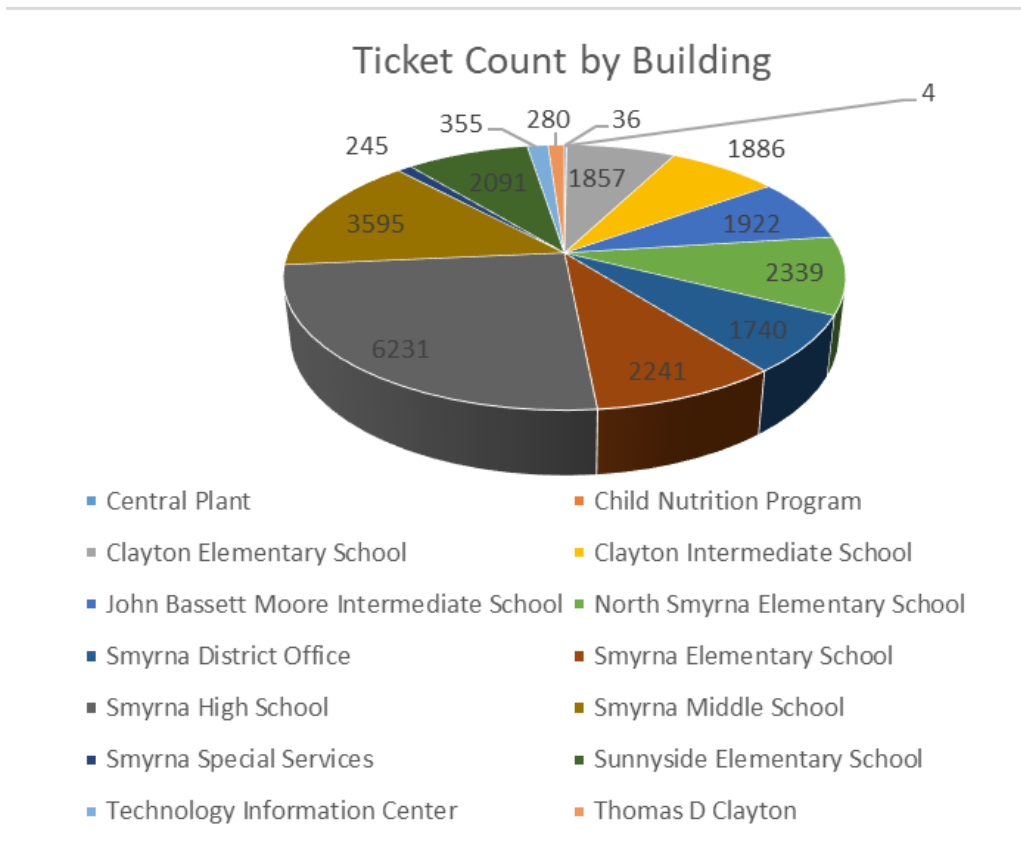

Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program (FFVP) is a USDA funded grant for North Smyrna Elementary. The grant allows Child Nutrition Staff to provide fresh fruits and vegetables to students three days per week. The Child Nutrition Program received \$22,481 for SY2018/19.

Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) is a USDA funded program that allows the Child Nutrition program to serve afterschool meals at Smyrna High, Smyrna Middle, John Bassett Moore Intermediate, North Smyrna Elementary, and Smyrna Elementary Schools at no cost to students. Students who stay after school for academic enrichment, clubs, sports, etc. are eligible for a meal. Approximately 61,000 afterschool meals were served in SY2018/19.

Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) is a federally-funded provision, which in SY2018/19 allowed the Smyrna Child Nutrition Program to serve 121,198 breakfast and 216,199 lunch meals at no cost to students at North Smyrna Elementary, Smyrna Elementary, and John Bassett Moore Intermediate Schools.

Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) is a USDA-based program which allowed the Smyrna Child Nutrition Program to serve 3,900 meals in the summer of 2019 at four locations in our community.

School Food Donation

Smyrna School District donates food to local shelters to help reduce food waste and food insecurity concerns in our community. These food donations can include sandwiches, salads, fresh fruits, vegetables, milk and frozen entrees/sides.

School Nutrition Outreach

Starting this year the Child Nutrition Program has put a focus on classroom based nutrition education. Each of our students in kindergarten through 4th grade will have a nutrition lesson in their classroom. The purpose of these lessons are to help expose our students to the importance of eating a healthy diet.

Food Pantry at Smyrna Middle School

The Harry K. Foundation, Food Bank of Delaware, and Smyrna School District have opened a food pantry at Smyrna Middle School. This food pantry is for families with a student/students in the Smyrna School District. The food pantry provides families in the district with food items supplied by the Food Bank of Delaware and local donations, as well as, personal hygiene items, and other items that the students in the district have requested be donated.

Student Collaboration

The Child Nutrition Program and the students in the Environmental Club at Smyrna High School are partnering together to reduce plastic use in the district cafeterias. Currently Smyrna High School, Smyrna Elementary and Sunnyside Elementary are piloting a new presentation form for packaging cold entrees.

Vision

Mission

The mission of the Smyrna School district maintenance department is to support the overall mission and values of the District, while maximizing a safe, healthy, clean, pleasant and functional learning environment.

Philosophy

The Buildings and Grounds staff is committed to a "One Team" effort to work together to keep our schools safe, clean and attractive, both inside and out.

Smyrna School District's Building and Grounds utilize an electronic work order system to make sure issues are handled in a timely and efficient manner. Our staff responds to an average of 135 maintenance issues monthly. The needs range from maintaining appropriate temperatures in buildings, to fixing doors or locks and keeping the lawns cut and parking lots clear and safe.

Over the past year multiple lights have been replaced to more energy efficient LED lighting for school improvements and to create a safer environment while also saving in costs and maintenance. We have applied for grants to continue to upgrade to LED lighting in the parking lots at the Middle School and the High School.



We use a preventive maintenance program district wide to ensure all equipment is maintained and serviced to provide a comfortable learning environment and ensure we get maximum life from equipment.

Preventive maintenance/safety checks are done on a monthly basis to district fleet vehicles to ensure staff and students have safe and reliable transportation.

The chief custodians have saved money on cleaning supplies and bought cleaning equipment to help keep all buildings clean and sanitized.

We hired new part time custodians in place of substitute custodians to be able to accomplish more work and yet still save on costs.

Custodial and maintenance staff attended all required training to stay current on safety procedures and policies.

The facilities maintenance staff possess the technical knowledge and skills to service and maintain the needs of the district by maintaining building systems, including but not limited to heating, air conditioning, refrigeration, plumbing, welding, carpentry, sports field maintenance and security (doors, locks).

The staff works with building administrators throughout the year to make all schools safe. We also work with the community to provide clean spaces for them to hold trainings, host sporting events and other community support activities.

The Smyrna School District School Climate and Safety Department is new for the 2019/20 school year. We have immersed Restorative and Trauma Informed Practices within our schools to offer a social and emotional response to every student. We have implemented the hand-model of the brain understanding and calming corners in all schools K-6. We are proud to be piloting the Take Care Delaware Program; which offers supports if needed, to students who have experienced police contact the night before the school day. Our district is proud to say our district received the Compassionate Champion Award from Governor Carney in May, 2019 for our work in Trauma Informed Practices.

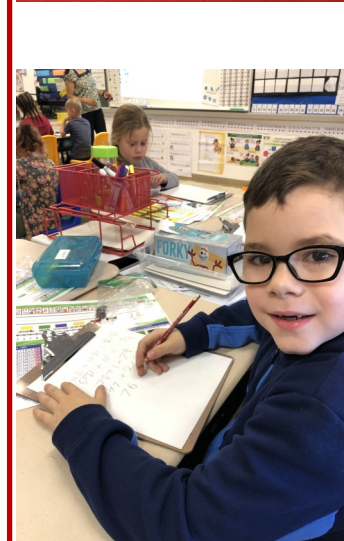

Every day, North Smyrna Elementary School (NSE) opens its doors with the daily goal to educate, inspire, nurture, and celebrate every one of our 630 students. Approximately 200 of these are our littlest Eagles, beginning their Smyrna School District academic career in NSE's Early Childhood Program with the remainder in our elementary setting from kindergarten to 3rd grade. Our experienced staff is dedicated to providing every student with an unrivaled educational environment fostering academic engagement and growth, self-respect, and strong relationships. We embrace and teach the Smyrna School District Community Core Values of respect, responsibility, perseverance, integrity, and compassion. As part of our continuing tradition of excellence at Smyrna School District, we offer Spanish Immersion, Early Childhood, the STEP Enrichment program for 3rd grade students, and the Comprehensive Learning Program. In addition, our school participates in numerous programs and activities for students including: Read Across America, Read for the Record, Girls on the Run, 3rd grade chorus, bi-monthly Kindness Projects, and family nights.

The resolve of our approach and quality of our programs are evident in our ratings and recognitions. NSE's Early Childhood Program has renewed its Star Level 5 quality rating, which is the highest obtainable level in the Delaware Stars for Early Success Quality Rating and Improvement System administered by the Delaware Department of Education. The Early Childhood Program first received this rating in 2015 and has maintained it ever since. NSE has also been recognized in 2017 as a Recognition School and in 2018 for Exceeds Expectations by the Delaware Department of Education. In 2018, Delaware Secretary of Education Susan Bunting named NSE a School of Continued Excellence, which was the only school in Delaware recognized for this achievement that year.

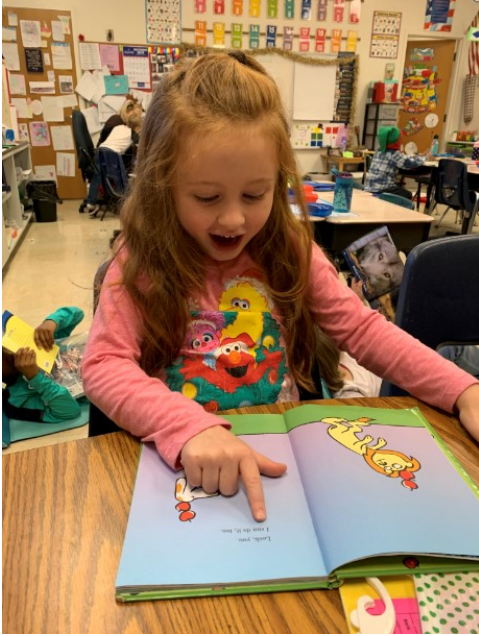

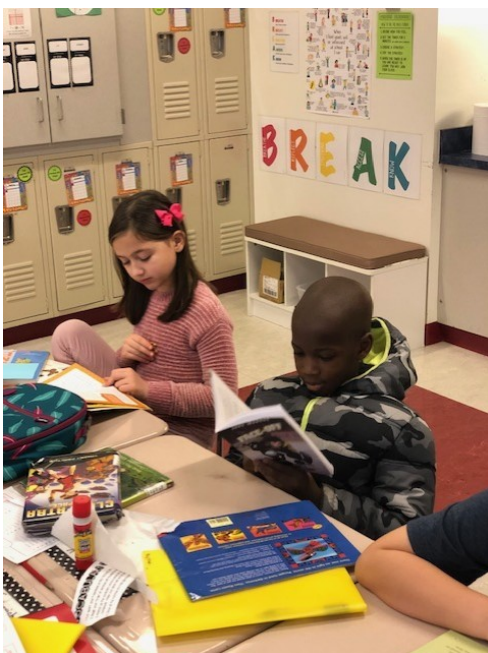

CIS is a place for learning, to inspire, to encourage, and to support teachers by providing a safe and loving environment to educate all so that both teachers and students can continue to build a foundation for lifelong learning.

Clayton Intermediate School is the newest addition in the Smyrna School District when it opened its doors in September of 2012. CIS offers a comprehensive Common Core State Standard-based education to students in grades 5 & 6. Currently, Bridges and Illustrative Math Curriculum, Wonders and Pearson Reading series, Comprehensive Science programs and Next Generation Social Studies provide the materials and structure of our daily instruction. We are a Learning Focused school in our instructional approach and strategies utilized. In addition to differentiated instruction in reading, writing, math, science and social studies, offerings of music, chorus, band, physical education, art, library science and technology round out the complete academic program for all grades.

The S.T.E.P. (Smyrna Triad Enrichment Program) provides advanced, hands-on learning for our gifted students. Our small group special education and support services team create and implement specialized education program for students who are differently-abled. This includes the use of innovative and technology-driven programs such as System 44, Read 180 and Math 180.

CIS offers before-school care through our child nutrition team in the CIS cafeteria called "Breakfast Club." After school care is provided by a site-based group managed by the Boys and Girls Club.

CIS offers many organization and clubs for students to exercise their gifts and talents. These organizations and clubs are Student Council, Safety Patrol, Odyssey of the Mind, Art Club, Technology Club, PBS Committee, School Newspaper, Girls on the Run, Heart and Soul, Iron, Drama Club, Recycling Club, Basketball Club, Homework Club, Volleyball, I Run, Girl Talk and Dance Club.

Smyrna Middle School serves 984 seventh and eighth grade students in the Smyrna School District. Students are on a two-day, ninety-minute block schedule having eight different classes. Students are on one of four teams which determines their primary hall for core classes and homeroom. These teams participate in monthly activities and field trips throughout the school year. Students have the opportunity to take not only their core courses, but PE, Health, Home Ec, Band, Chorus, Ag Science, STEM, Creative Writing, Art, Spanish, Digital Storytelling, Computer Tech, Public Speaking, Geography, Sports History, Theatre, Family Consumer Science and Wellness.

Students have the opportunity to participate in a wide variety of clubs including Go Baby Go, Special Olympics, Book Club, Sign Language, FCA, FFA, BPA, Math League, and Honor Society. Sports offerings include cross country, volleyball, football, field hockey, soccer, cheerleading, basketball, wrestling, baseball, softball, lacrosse and track. (Congratulations to our undefeated volleyball team who earned first place in the state tournament!)

Our academic programs ask students to challenge their thinking and analyze materials as they learn. We offer intervention courses to those who need extra support and we have also started a course where students who are behind in their learning can work to catch up using an online curriculum while still participating in their core classes each day. 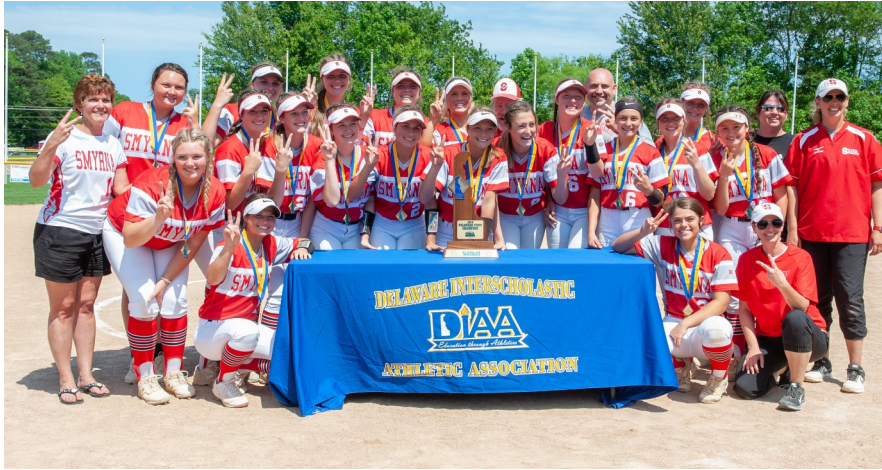
