## NOTICE OF FERPA RIGHTS

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age the following rights:

## Inspection

You may inspect the student's education records within 45 days of the day the District receives a request for access. You should submit to the Principal a written request identifying the record(s) you wish to inspect. The Principal will notify you of the time and place of inspection.

## Amendment

If you believe education records are inaccurate, you may request the records be amended. Such a request must be in writing, and directed to the Principal. The request must identify the part of the record you want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate. If the District denies your request, the District will notify you of the decision, advise of the right to a hearing, and provide the hearing procedures.

## Consent

You have the right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without

Under the No Child Left Behind Act a parent has the right to know the following information:

» Their child's level of achievement in each state academic assessment.

Upon the parents request the school is to provide the following information:
» Whether the teacher has met state qualifications and licensing criteria for the grade level and subject areas in which the teacher provides instruction.
» Whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or other provision al status through which state qualification or licensing criteria have been waived.
» The baccalaureate degree major of the teacher and any graduate certification or degree held by the teacher and the field of discipline of the certification or degree.
" Whether the child is provided services by paraprofessionals and if so their qualifications.

The following letter will provide details on how parents may easily access information regarding their child's teacher(s).

## Dear Parent:

As a parent of a student in the Smyrna School District you have the right to know the professional qualifications of the classroom teachers who instruct your child. Federal law allows you to ask
for certain information about your child's classroom teachers, and requires us to give you the information in a timey manner if you ask for it. Specifically, you have the right to ask for the following information about each of your child's classroom teachers:
» Whether the Delaware Department of Education has licensed or qualified the teacher for the grades and subjects he or she teaches.
» Whether the Delaware Department of Education has decided that the teacher can teach in a classroom without being licensed or qualified under state regulations because of special circumstances.
» The teacher's college major; whether the teacher has any advanced degrees and, if so, the subject of the degrees.
» Whether any teachers' aides or similar paraprofessionals provide Title I services to your child and, if they do, their qualifications.

You will find the teacher's certification under "credentials" and college major under "qualification."

### 1.0 Programs Covered by the Complaint Process

This complaint process shall apply to the following programs: Title I Part A Improving Basic Programs Operated by Local Education Agencies; Title I Part B-1 Reading First; Title I Part B2 Early Reading First; Title I Part B-3 William F. Goodling Even Start Family Literacy Program; Title I Part C Education of Migratory Children; Title I Part D Prevention and Intervention Programs for Children and Youth Who are Neglected, Delinquent, or at Risk; Title I Part F Comprehensive School Reform; Title I Part G Advanced Placement; Title II Part A Teacher and Principal Training and Recruiting Fund, Grants to States; Title II Part A-5-2151(B) School Leadership; Title II Part D 1 and 2 Enhancing Education Through Technology; Title III Language Instruction for Limited English Proficient and Immigrant Students; Title IV Part A Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities; Title IV Part B 21st Century Community Learning Centers; Title V Part A Innovative Programs and Title V Part B-1 Public Charter Schools.

### 2.0 Right to File a Complaint

An organization or an individual may file a complaint regarding an alleged violation of Federal Program Statutes or regulations by the Delaware Department of Education or the Local Education Agency. For purposes of this regulation, a Local Education Agency shall also include charter schools. A written and signed complaint shall be filed with the Delaware Department of Education.
2.1 The complaint shall include a statement specifying the alleged violation by the State Education Agency or a Local Education Agency. Such statement shall include facts and documentation of the alleged violation.
2.2 The Delaware Department of Education shall investigate the complaint and issue a written report including findings of fact and a decision to the parties included in the complaint within sixty (60) working days of the receipt of the complaint. An extension of the time limit may be made by the Delaware Department of Education only if exceptional circumstances exist with respect to a particular complaint.
2.3 The Delaware Department of Education may conduct an independent onsite investigation of the complaint, if it is determined that an on site investigation is necessary.
2.4 The complaint shall allege a violation that occurred not more than one (1) year prior to the date that the complaint is received.

### 3.0 Complaint Made to the Local Education Agency

An organization or an individual is encouraged to file a written, signed complaint with the Local Education Agency, prior to submission of the complaint to the Delaware Department of Education, concerning an alleged violation by the Local Education Agency of a Federal statute or regulation that applies to the Local Education Agency's program.
3.1 The complaint shall include a statement specifying the alleged violation by the Local Edu cation Agency. Such statement shall include facts and documentation of the alleged violation.
3.2 The superintendent or the agency head of the Local Education Agency shall investigate the complaint and issue a written report including findings of fact and a decision to the parties involved in the complaint within sixty (60) working days of the receipt of the com plaint,

3.3 An appeal of the Local Education Agency decision may be made by the complainant to the Delaware Department of Education. The appeal shall be in writing and signed by the individual or by an individual representative of the organization making the appeal. The Delaware Department of Education shall resolve the appeal in the same manner as a complaint, as indicated in 2.0 .

### 4.0 Review of Final Decision by the U.S. Department of Education

Any party to the complaint has the right to request that the Secretary, U. S. Department of Education, review the final decision of the Delaware Department of Education. The request for an appeal of the decision to the Secretary, U. S. Department of Education, shall be made in writing to the Delaware Department of Education within sixty days of the receipt of the decision.

SMRYNA SCHOOL DISTRICT'S NOTICE OF RIGHTS UNDER THE PROTECTION OF PUPIL RIGHTS AMENDMENT (PPRA)

The Protection of Pupil Rights Amendment affords parents, students who are 18, and emancipated minors the following rights regarding the District's conduct of surveys, collection and use of information for marketing purposes, and certain physical exams.

Protected Information Surveys The District is required to obtain consent permitting your child to participate in certain school activities, or you may elect to opt out of such activities. These activities, known as protected information surveys, include a student survey, analysis, or evaluation concerning one or more of the following:

Political affiliations or beliefs of the student or student's parents;
2. Mental or psychological problems of the student or student's family;
3. Sexual behavior or attitudes;
4. Illegal, anti-Social, self-incrimi nating, or demeaning behavior;
5. Critical appraisals of others with whom respondents have close family relationships
6. Legally recognized privileged relationships, such as with lawyers, doctors, or ministers;

## Smyrna Elementary Construction: Traffic Pattern Change

As of Monday, May 11, demolition and site work has begun on the kitchen, parking lots on South Street, and storm water management. The most immediate impact will be on food service and on travelling to and from school.

## Temporary lunch service

Serving lunch at school from a temporary setup is not new to the Smyrna School District. Over the past decade, we have safely and efficiently served breakfast and lunch at multiple schools while kitchens have been updated. Starting Monday, May 11, Smyrna Elementary School will be following the included temporary menu. The breakfast menu will rotate weekly, while the lunch menu will rotate every two weeks. ## Travelling to and from school

Our parking areas and sidewalks along South Street will be removed and replaced as part of our improvement project. This will have an impact on staff parking and student drop-off/pick-up.
Bus-riders -The only change to bus-riding students during the renovation project will be where the busses unload and load while at school. During arrival and dismissal, all six busses will unload and

load curbside along School Lane. There will be no student drop-off or pick-up along School Lane for the rest of the school year.
Car-riders - Beginning Monday, May 11, there will be no access to the school along South Street (gym/cafeteria lobby entrance or fourth grade wing entrance). With busses being parked along School Lane, school staff will park in the bus lane and curbside along Kent Way.
Car-riders will now use curbside drop-off (and pickup) in the existing bus lane at the front of the school (near main office). Staff will be on hand to unload students directly from vehicles and to supervise children until it is time to enter the building (8:20). Students who eat breakfast at school will be allowed to enter at 8:10, as usual.
Student pick-up will also occur in the current bus lane. Cars picking students up from school must enter the driveway from the southwest along Kent Way, move through the bus lane where students will be loaded into vehicles, and exit onto School Lane (see enclosed diagram of school property). Out of concern for student safety, there will be no student drop-off or pick-up along School Lane for the rest of the school year.
Walkers - Since many of our regular doorways will not be open during construction, walkers will be dismissed from the same area as car-riding students. As usual, they will check out with a staff member before leaving school grounds.

## Early dismissals

While we certainly understand that there are times that an early dismissal from school is necessary, due to the volume of activity occurring at the end of the day in such a concentrated area, we request that you do not ask for your child to be dismissed after 3:00. Please either sign your child out prior to 3:00, or wait until normal dismissal time at 3:25.
We are very excited about the pending improvements to our school-your school! During this process, we know that questions will come up and that routines and procedures will need to be revisited and revised. 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Smyrna Eagles Football Report


The Smyrna Eagle Football family finished the season with a 5-5 record in arguably the toughest conference in the state. With wins over perennial Henlopen contenders Caesar Rodney and Sussex Central the Eagles look to build on their momentum as they enter the 2015 season.
Quarterback Nolan Henderson established himself as player to watch in our state, throwing for over 2200 yards and rushing for another 340 yards. The young gun-slinger tallied 21 touchdowns (TDs) through the air while adding another 7 on the ground and garnered second Team All-Conference honors.
Will Knight had a remarkable first season, rushing for 961 yards and 8 TDs, caught 22 passes for 417 yards and 6 TDs, and connected with Junior WR Brandon Bishop for a 61 yard TD strike against CR.
The receiving core carried their fair-share of the load, combining for 150 catches. Charlie Taylor (34 receptions 582 yards 7 TDs) and Donte Ritchie (48 receptions 744yd 5TDs) led our corps in production, while Bishop added a vertical threat with 36 receptions 509 yd and 3 TDs. Juniors Hunter Melson and Marquelle Bennett rounded out a solid year by adding another TD and over 100 yards.
The offensive line was led by Junior Terren Carter who earned second team all-conference. Sophmore Jerren Carter, Juniors Phil Nix and Evan Gallaher, and Freshman Desmond Wilson, Anthony DelRe, and Mike Carrow all started for the Eagles. Senior Alex Wisnewski added some depth to the unit as well.
The defense was led by third Team All-State Linebacker Cody Biddle who set new SHS record recording 131 tackles (54
solo), 2.5 sacks, 10 TFL , and 2 INTs. Fellow Senior Alajuwon Hunter had a great year at linebacker with 99 tackles. Josh and Eli Hutchinson had breakout years, tallying 85 and 55 tackles respectively. Josh led the team in TFLs (13) and fumble recoveries (3).
The defensive line was anchored by Sophomore Jamier Smith and Freshmen Anthony DelRe and Desmond Wilson. Senior Stedman Kpana, Junior Kalen Wilson, and Senior Jhiel Watson saw significant time sharing the duties as well.
The defensive backs were led by Sophomore Safety, Jake Kaiser (\#20) who finished fourth on the team with 82 tackles. Sophomore Zion Cole and Junior Clevon Witkowski solidified the CB spots while Seniors Jason Medero, Justin Jones, and Kam Pipes added depth to the group. Junior Jamal Powell helped round out the CB position.

The special teams unit, consisting mostly of young players, did a terrific job in springing Charlie Taylor for 2 KR TDs and provided outstanding field positon in our games. Senior specialist Chase Whaley earned second team all-conference by averaging over 39 yards per punt and was a threat with his speed and athleticism in our kick-fake game. Senior Justin "Bones" Jones did a solid job as a holder all season long. Moses "Deuce" Carter is an electrifying punt returner with sneaky speed and quickness to go along with a fearless attitude
